Two-Year Program in Object Relations Theory & Practice

Beginning July 8-14, 2007

Chair: Paul M. Koehler, MSW

Program Overview

The Two-Year Certificate Program in Object Relations Theory and Practice provides a concentrated immersion in object relations theory and therapy in the Washington DC area. The program is designed in a modular, block training format to accommodate both local professionals and those who commute to Washington. The two-year program consists of two summer institutes and eight three-day weekend conferences over the course of two years.

Come study and learn from experience with internationally acclaimed object relations experts, IPI faculty, and other program participants. You'll get lectures, videos, case presentations by faculty and participants, and the small Affective Learning Group.

The Affective Model and the Small Group

The Affective Learning Model is an educational format derived from object relations principles. Faculty and students learn together from didactic material and from experience to integrate cognition and affect, theory and technique, intrapsychic and interpersonal dimensions.

Small affective learning groups are an essential element of The Affective Learning Process. Participants meet in these groups twice daily during summer institutes and during weekend conferences in order to integrate their intellectual and emotional reactions to the material at individual and group levels, and to apply it to their clinical situations. The small affective group retains the same membership and leader over the two years of the course. This ensures a committed, intense integrative experience for which participants need to be physically and emotionally resilient.

Participants say that the small group is the place where they discuss, argue, wrestle with, experience personally, and take in the concepts that then become a natural part of their way of working.

Supervision and Personal Therapy

While supervision and therapy are not required for the two-year core program, supervision is recommended and available individually or in groups in cities with IPI faculty or anywhere by telephone or videolink. Faculty will be offering group supervision by telephone for participants in order to facilitate clinical application of object relations theory. Participants often undertake personal therapy by choice. Supervision and therapy are required for the Clinical Application Program, which many students elect to add to the Two-Year Program (see Clinical Program description in this brochure).

Summer Institutes

(for 2-year participants only)

July 8–14, 2007

Object Relations Theory and Practice

This institute will cover the basics of object relations theory from Kleinian and British Independent object relations points of view, and applies them to clinical practice.

July 13–19, 2008

Infant Observation and Research Contributions to Object Relations Theory and Practice

Infant observation, non-human primate research, and attachment research applied to containment and countertransference in clinical work.

Weekend Courses

National Program 2007-2008

You may enroll for just one weekend, for several, or come to them as part of the two-year object relations training program. Conferences begin at 9:00 am on Friday and end at 1:00 pm on Sunday. Conferences feature didactic and clinical presentations and daily large and small group discussion. Saturday morning workshops, 9:00–10:30 am are open to all mental health professionals, and will be followed by a reception and an optional small group discussion from 11:00 am to noon for participants attending the workshop, the cost for Saturday morning only is \$30 (IPI Members can attend for free with a guest). Pre-registration is required. Schedules, reading lists and educational objectives will be provided. Weekend courses for the 2007-2008 academic year will be held in the Washington, DC area, with the exception of the March 28-30, 2008 weekend to be held in Salt Lake City, Utah (see hotel information page 6).

This weekend will reconsider some of the central ideas of Freud's 1937 paper "Analysis: Terminable and Interminable." We will study questions of the "end point" and "limits" of the therapy process, and the use and abuse of the therapy process in the face of perverse and parasitic attachments. Also considered: therapeutic ambition, addiction to therapy, and the role of envy and pathologic narcissism as anti-therapeutic forces. Charles Ashbach, PhD is a senior and founding member of the IPI faculty and co-author of *Object Relations Group Therapy*.

Saturday Morning lecture: *Charles Ashbach: "Where are we when the working-through is through?" Some considerations on factors limiting the psychotherapy enterprise.*

March 28-30, 2008

Encountering the Slippery Slope in Psychoanalytic Family Therapy

International Conference on Child, Couple, and Family Therapy in Salt Lake City, Utah

Therapists who work in-depth with families must be prepared for the slippery slope of the family unconscious. Papers and presentations will feature American and international contributions on the clinical practice of psychoanalytic family therapy. The conference format includes daily small group discussions, conference participant and presenter dialogues, and panel discussions, so that working in depth can be affectively and intellectually taken in and processed. Keynote presentations by Kurt Gunther, MD (Vienna, Austria) and Lewis Kirshner, MD (Boston, MA).

Call for Papers: We invite submissions for papers to be delivered at this conference. Any child, couple or family therapy clinical topic will be considered, and since the theme for the conference is "Encountering the Slippery Slope..." we would especially want a focus on how the case impacts the therapist's use of self: for example, how the dynamics of the work impact on the subjective experience of the therapist. Countertransference experiences would be very welcome. Please submit 100-250 word proposal or abstract by August 1, 2007 to Carl Bagnini at Edre54@aol.com. We will respond to your submission by August 20th. If your proposal is accepted we will then need a paper of not more than 4500 words to be submitted electronically by September 20th. Participants presenting papers at the conference will be required to register for the entire conference.

Two-Year Certificate Program in Couple, Child & Family Therapy

Program Chair: Carl Bagnini, LCSW, BCD

Summer Institute Chair: Yolanda de Varela, PhD

IPI is now offering expanded certificate training in Couple, Child and Family Therapy. The two-year program consists of two week-long summer institutes, two weekend conferences, annually including two early morning Saturday and Sunday one hour case discussions on child, couple and family assessment and treatment, a weekly 90 minute course by telephone or videoconference, and weekly supervision in each of the two years. It is recommended, but not required that participants also take the course in Infant Observation (See page 5).

The certificate in Theory and Practice is earned upon completion of the Two-Year object relations training program described on panels 2-3.

Supervision Program

Chair: Sheila Hill, MSW

The IPI faculty offers supervision to individuals and groups. Anyone may request supervision from IPI, whether enrolled in an IPI program or not. Supervision is available but not required for students in the Two-Year IIORT Program. It is a requirement for a certificate in the Couple, Child and Family Program.

Individual, paired and group supervision is offered face-to-face, by telephone, or for sites or individuals with videoconference capability by videoconference. Currently those IPI sites with videolinks are Chevy Chase, Salt Lake City, Long Island, Omaha and Panama. Fees vary by site. For more information contact IPI.

Clinical Application Program

Chair: Sheila Hill, MSW

The Clinical Application Program (CAP) is our advanced psychotherapy program. It builds on the Two-Year IIORT Program in Object Relations Theory and Practice, offering advanced training in applying object relations theory to clinical work. The CAP is open to current students, or graduates, of the IIORT Two-Year Program. Graduates of a comparable training program may also qualify. A Clinical Certificate in Object Relations Therapy is given upon satisfactory completion of these four components of the Clinical Application Program:

I. Graduation from the Two-Year Program in Object Relations Theory and Practice.

II. Completion of an additional 72 hours of Seminars. These hours can be earned by participating in one or more of the following seminars and conferences and the total hours must equal 72.

1. Attending a seminar series in a local IPI program.
2. Attending IPI weekend conferences after completion of the core program.
3. Participating in a telephone seminar.
4. Participating in a videoconference or teleconference series at one of the IPI sites. Currently, there are two series: 1) The infant observation series links students in Chevy Chase, Salt Lake City and elsewhere by phone. 2) The Master Teacher series links presenters and students in Chevy Chase, Long Island, Omaha and Salt Lake City by video and elsewhere by telephone.
5. Attending a week-long summer Couple, Child and Family Therapy Institute

III. Supervision In order to meet the supervision requirement students are required to have three supervisory experiences with three different IPI national faculty supervisors. Supervision can be face-to-face, by telephone or by videoconference where available. Students are required to have at least one individual supervision for 35 hours. The remaining two supervisions may be two individual (35 hours each), two paired (50 hours each), or a combination of any two different types: individual (35 hours), paired (50 hours), group (90 hours). In order for supervision to count for the CAP requirements, a student must already be enrolled with IPI by participation in an IPI satellite seminar, the two-year IPI object relations program, or have graduated from the two-year IPI object relations program. Written evaluations of the supervisory experience by both the supervisor and the supervisee are required and are used to enhance learning.

IV. Personal Therapy: 2 years, twice weekly. Two years of twice weekly psychotherapy with an analytically-oriented therapist (not necessarily of the object relations school) is required. The psychotherapy can either be prior to, or concurrent with, taking the program. More therapy may be suggested if indicated.

A distance learning analytic training of international scope

Analytic candidates meet in person annually for one week-long summer institute and four weekend conferences over three years, and participate in person or by telephone in supervision, seminars on analytic theory and practice, and personal analysis.

The program is designed for psychotherapists interested in a contemporary, object relations-oriented program. It appeals to those who cannot attend a traditional institute because of their location, family needs, work responsibilities, or preference for the orientation and training methods at IIPT.

- Collegial, collaborative atmosphere with candidate input
- Credit towards a PhD up to 28 credit hours at a distance learning university, North Central University of Arizona

Shared Unconscious Phantasy In The Couple

The 2007 Couple, Child and Family summer institute will be dedicated to the study of the concept of "shared unconscious phantasy." We will study how the analysis of the unconscious shared phantasy helps to simultaneously analyze transference and countertransference issues; mutual projective and introjective identifications; and the level of Oedipal or Pre-Oedipal functioning in the couple. The frame of work will follow David E. Scharff and Jill S. Scharff's parameters for Object Relations Couple Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy.

As background to our study we will read Elizabeth Bott Spillius on Freud and Klein's concept of Phantasy; Neville Symington's ideas on how phantasy affects that which it represents; and Ronald Britton's papers on *The Missing Link* and *Sharing Psychic Space*.

As usual, all presentations will include clinical material. Sufficient space will be provided for the participant's own case material and small group discussions, and each day will devote time to two affective learning groups (see panel 2).
